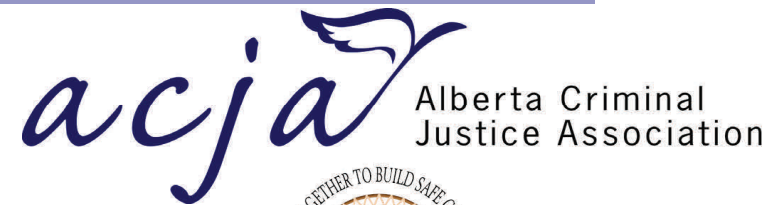

## Presenters

### Human Trafficking 101

Retired from the RCMP in 2003 after 31 years of Federal Government and General Duty service, Garry Drummond is now the “Human Trafficking Awareness Coordinator” for the North West Region Immigration & Passport Section of the RCMP. He supports Human Trafficking related matters through the delivery of information sessions, conducting research and monitoring Human Trafficking investigative and intelligence activities and liaising with partners towards the development of enforcement techniques and protocols to ensure the detection and safety of Human Trafficking victims

### Human Trafficking and the Law

Matthew Taylor is Legal Counsel with Justice Canada’s Criminal Law Policy Section. He is responsible for a wide range of matters in the areas of organized crime and trafficking in persons. In 2005, Matthew was a member of the team responsible for the development of Canada’s *Criminal Code* offences on trafficking in persons. He has delivered training on trafficking in persons through out Canada and abroad and has provided support to the United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime and the Commonwealth Secretariat on various anti-trafficking initiatives. Most recently, Matthew led the development of criminal law amendments to better target organized crime activity in Canada.

### Survivor Story of Human Trafficking

Timea Eva Nagy, is the daughter of a Police woman, and she immigrated to Canada 12 years ago. Timea is a Survivor of Human Trafficking, a Speaker and Social Advocate from Toronto. Timea's sex slave nightmare took place in Toronto in 1998 after arriving from Budapest, Hungary in the hopes of fulfilling a summer position. She was kidnapped, controlled, and kept under horrible conditions and forced to work in the sex trade in Toronto and surrounding areas. Ms. Nagy is a founder of Walk With Me, an Independent Organization Helping Human Trafficked Victims in Ontario. Within the last 11 months her organization has assisted and assisting Victims of Human Trafficking on a daily basis. Ms. Nagy has provided training and worked with many agencies in Canada the US, and Europe. Her main focus and passion is to work and assist law enforcement in Canada. Some of the agencies she has trained and or assisted include the RCMP, OPP, York Region Police, Toronto Police, FBI Kansas City, Vancouver PD, Federal Judges, United States District 8. Just to name a few. She finally finished her book, *Memories of a Sex Slave Survivor*, that she dedicated to Law enforcement around the world. (Edmonton Police is also been recognized in her book)

### Action Coalition on human Trafficking

**Edmonton** - Andrea Burkhart is the Provincial Coordinator of ACT Alberta, the Action Coalition on human Trafficking. ACT Alberta is a coalition of government ministries, nongovernmental organizations, survivors of trafficking and the general public concerned with identifying and responding to Human Trafficking in Alberta. There are several chapters across the province. Andrea has expertise in developing and facilitating training and awareness sessions for broad audiences and, through her work at Changing Together. A Centre for Immigrant Women, providing direct services and referrals for internationally trafficked women. Andrea has an extensive history of working in the nonprofit sector with immigrants and refugees and completed a BA in Cultural Anthropology at the University of Alberta.

**Calgary** - Lara Quarterman completed a Master of Arts degree in Conflict, Development & Security (Lancaster University, UK) before working in East Africa to prevent and respond to Human Trafficking with the International Organization for Migration and then returning to Canada in 2008 and since then has been coordinating the activities and initiatives of the Calgary chapter of the Action Coalition on human Trafficking (ACT).

### Clinical Traumatologist

Jacqui Linder is a certified Clinical Traumatologist and provisional psychologist currently pursuing her PhD in psychology. Jacqui is the psychological consultant for Alberta’s Action Coalition Against Human Trafficking and former chair of the Community Voices Against Sexual Violence coalition. She most recently became involved in the Chrysalis Network national telephone counseling line for victims of sex and labour trafficking.

### Law Enforcement and Partnerships

Edmonton Police Service members will discuss their experience with recent Human Trafficking cases.
